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The Declaration of Independence

Few Americans are aware of the tremendous sacrifices made by the brave and selfless men who signed *The Declaration of Independence*. Have you ever wondered what happened to those men who signed *The Declaration of Independence*?

Five signers were captured by British as traitors and were tortured before they died.

Twelve had their homes ransacked or burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary army.

Another had two sons captured.

Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardships of war.

What kind of men were they? Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants. Nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means and well educated. But they signed *The Declaration of Independence*, knowing full well the penalty would be death if they were captured. They signed and pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts and died in rags.

Thomas McKean was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in Congress without pay and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken and poverty was his reward.

Vandals or soldiers or both looted the properties of **Ellery, Clymer, Hall, Walton, Gwinnett, Hetward, Rutledge** and **Middleton**.

Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, after which she died within a few months.

Miss Annie

1902-2002

"Miss Annie", who many of you knew personally, and for others who knew her by sending cards to her



over the years, died 5 June 2002 at 7:30 AM in the Richmond County Hospice. God had blessed her with a good clear

mind right to the end. Once she reached the 100th birthday in March, she seemed to start failing. In two months she weakened to where she could not walk when Horace saw her last on Sunday, 2 June, his birthday. He said, "She looked at me that day, placed her hand on my cheek, and told me that she would not be there when I came the next time, and then she said 'I Love you'. I left knowing that was the last time I would see her."

She passed on without major pain. She was such a beautiful lady. Her funeral was held in Hamlet, North Carolina, at the Watkins-King Funeral Home on Sunday, June 9, 2002, at 3PM.

Obituary

"Miss Annie" **Elizabeth Bullard Peele** was born March 26, 1902, on the Bullard Farm, just north of Gibson, North Carolina, the daughter of **George Robertson Bullard** (1874-1941) and **Jeretta Isabella Wright** (1873-1945). At the age of 14, young Annie joined St. John's Methodist Church and committed her life to Christ. She married **Marvin Buford Peele, Sr.**, at the age of 21 and moved her membership to Ghio Tabernacle United Methodist Church. Here they served faithfully, committed to serving God, all their lives. For the next 79 years, she lived on the Peele Farm that she and her husband bought as newly weds in 1923, at 1105 Ghio Road, south of Hamlet, North

Carolina. She was "**Miss Annie**" to many and she leaves a lasting impression of a beautiful lady on all who met her. She was a Sunday school teacher and a member of the Women's Society of Christian Services. She was preceded in death by an infant daughter, **Phyllis Corine** (1931), her husband **Marvin Buford Peele** (1890-1984), and her son **Cecil Pate Peele, Sr.** (1928-1996). On June 5, 2002, **Mrs. Annie Bullard Peele** was called to rest by our Heavenly Father, and to join her husband **Marvin Buford Peele**. She was a beloved wife, mother, and homemaker. She died while in the care of the Richmond County Hospice.

Miss Annie is survived by four loving children: **Marvin Buford Peele, Jr.**, of Monroe, VA; **Mrs. Elizabeth Ethridge White** of Hamlet, NC; **George Leroy Peele** of Hamlet, NC; **Horace Bullard Peele** of San Antonio, TX, and by two younger sisters **Josephine Baker** and **Myrtle Webb**. Miss Annie has 15 grandchildren, 24 great-grandchildren and 5 great-great grandchildren, many nieces, nephews, and friends. The family wishes to gratefully acknowledge and expresses their appreciation for all the cards, flowers, visits, food and other expressions of love and sympathy shown during the time of their bereavement.

It is said that only one person in two billion will live to be 116 or older. And only one in a few will live to be 100 or older. (Don't have the exact number to that.) Miss Annie lived 100 years. During those years, many changes in

our world occurred. She saw very few cars in her early days; saw the beginning of what we know as “mother’s day”; she saw the use of early electricity, and antibiotics; ... and on and on. Horace spoke at her funeral on what her life was like during the past 100 years. I hope you will indulge me as I put his words here, to share with you. Miss Annie was truly a remarkable person. She will be missed by so many. Yet the angels in heaven truly rejoiced as she entered the gates of heaven!

I want to thank my brothers Marvin and George and sister Elizabeth for all the care they gave to Mother in her final years, especially my brother George who attended almost daily since father died 18 years ago.

One of Mothers favorite stories was about my brother George. Apparently when I was born he was so happy to have a little brother that he told Mom that he was going to “Take that baby and ride him around the house in his little Red Wagon.” Well, before I got home someone ran over the little red wagon. George still owes me that ride.

One of my favorite things I did to excite Mother was to say “Miss Annie, do you know what?” “You sure do look pretty!” Her eyes would light up, she would smile real pretty, look at me, and say “Why thank you, you took after me!”

Mother lived in a wonderful time. The 100 years that she lived brought America from the being a horse and wagon country to the world power that it is today. Just think of all the inventions, discoveries, changes that happened in this great country during her 100 years. Compare that to the hardships of her Mother and her Grandmother before her. Compare that to these interesting facts about this country at the time when Mother was born. These are interesting to me in that they tell about what Mother saw on earth while she was here.

Life expectancy in the United States was 47.

Only 14% of the homes had a bathtub.

Only 8% of the homes had a telephone. A three-minute call from Denver to New York City cost eleven dollars.

Only 6% of all Americans had graduated from high school.

The average US worker made between \$200 and \$400 per year, a Doctor made \$2500.

Ninety percent of all Doctors had no college education.

More than 95% of all births took place at home. Mother was born at her Father’s house that had its own windmill power plant before the country had electricity. My Brother Marvin was also born in that house. And I can remember the large batteries that were used to store the electricity.

Sugar cost four cents a pound. Eggs were fourteen cents a dozen. Coffee cost fifteen cents a pound.

Most women only washed their hair once a month and used borax or egg yolks for shampoo.

Tennessee had more people than California.

The American flag had 45 stars. Arizona, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Hawaii and Alaska hadn’t been admitted to the union.

Drive-by-shootings were an ongoing problem in Denver, teenage boys randomly shooting from horse back.

The remote desert community of Las Vegas, Nevada, only had thirty residents.

The five leading causes of death in the US were:

- Pneumonia and influenza
- Tuberculosis
- Diarrhea
- Heart disease

- Stroke

Plutonium, insulin, and antibiotics hadn't been discovered yet.

Scotch tape, crossword puzzles, canned beer, and iced tea hadn't been invented.

There was no Mother's Day or Father's Day.

Speaking of Father's Day, it is next Sunday. Next Sunday, like today, will always be one that we will remember. Our Father, Marvin Buford Peele, died on June the 16th in 1984. He was 94 years of age.

Before he died, Mother wrote down some notes about the olden days as they recalled them.

Dad was still wearing dresses when he was 2 ½ years old.

A hen sold for 25 cents.

Fish was 25 cents for a mess.

You could make a dress for 35 cents.

Corn and peas was \$1.00 a bushel

Pigs cost \$1.00 to \$1.50 a head.

A person earned 33 and 1/3 cents picking 100 pounds of cotton.

Dad worked for 25 cents a day.

When Mother was born there were only 8,000 cars in the US and 144 miles of paved roads. Mother even remembered the name of her Father's first car; it was a "*Bush*." It did not have a top. It was made between 1917 and 1926.

Mom and dad bought their first car, a 1925 Model T for \$495, half down and half when the crops came in.


Mother was 8 years old when Haley's Comet made its spectacular visit to earth in 1910. When it returned in the 1990s, I told Mother that you could see it. She wanted to go outside and see the Comet. We went out behind the barn in the dark of the night away from the lights and when she saw the Comet, she said "now I have seen everything."

I am afraid she was wrong, she had not then seen the beginning of our future, something that started with 9/11.

As some of you may know, I have maintained a web site for Mother for several years and her "Internet Pals" have sent her hundreds of cards over the years for Christmas and Birthday. Some came from Japan, Germany, Australia, and England. I sent an email to them about mother's death and I have some very nice responses. Many of you know that I do family genealogy, well one of the responses said that they could just see Miss Annie going to a big Party in Heaven with a pad and pencil getting names and dates of ancestors for me.

On Dad's birthday in 1998, we erected a monument to the Peele Family in the cemetery where Mother will be buried. It contains the first eleven generations of our family history. While you are there today, please take a look, Miss Annie was the last survivor of the first eleven generations.

Last Sunday, I was visiting Mother at the Hospice and I told Mother that I had to leave and go back to Washington. She looked at me, placed her left hand on my cheek and said "I will not be here when you come next time." And then she said, "I love you".

From: "Horace B. Peele"

I have the following will, written on 19 August 1839 in Southampton Co., VA and probated 17 April 1848. See the note at the end, do any of you (Joyner, anyone) have knowledge of this family?

Text: I William Peele of the County of Southampton and State of Virginia do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in Manner and form following {Viz:}:

1st I desire that all my just debts and funeral expences to be paid:

2ndly After the payment of my debts and funeral expenses, I give to my wife Elizabeth F. Peele all the property that I die Seised and possessed, both real and personal, and the increase thereof (except two Small legacies hereafter Mentioned) to her the said and her heirs forever.-

3rdly I give to my Daughter Henrietta Peele five dollars.

4thly I give to my Daughter Mary Jane Peele five dollars.

And lastly I do hereby Constitute and appoint my wife Elizabeth F. Peele Sole executrix of this my last Will and Testament, (without giving Security) hereby revoking all other former Wills or Testaments by me made:

In Witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and affixed my Seal this 19th day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand Eight hundred and thirty nine:

Wm Peele (Seal)

Witnessed: Signed Sealed published and delivered by William Peele as and for his last Will and testament, in the presence and hearing of us, who at his request and in his presence have Subscribed our names as witnesses:
Stephen Murdaugh
Harrison D. Moore
James T. Moore

Proved: At a Court held for the County of Southampton the 17th day of April 1848. The last Will and Testament of William Peele was proved by the oaths of Harrison D. Moore and James T. Moore two of the subscribing witnesses thereto- and Ordered to be Recorded: And on the Motion of Elizabeth F. Peele the executrix therein named who made oath and gave bond: {the Will

directing no security should be given and the Court requesting none} in the penalty of Six thousand dollars conditioned as the law directs, certificate is granted her for obtaining a probat of Said Will in due form.

Note: There were no Peele families recorded in Southampton County, Virginia in the 1830 Census. In the 1850 Census, there is a Mary Jane Peel, age 14, one of 4 differently named children (3 females, 1 male) in household of farmer Joseph JOYNER (#372, Page 307b).

At the Battle of Yorktown, **Thomas Nelson, Jr.**, noted that British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. The owner quickly urged General Washington to open fire on the dwelling. The home was destroyed. Nelson died a bankrupt man.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and gristmill were laid waste. For more than a year, he lived in the forests and in caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later, he died from exhaustion and a broken heart.

Morris and **Livingston** suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians; they were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more. They pledged: *"For the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of the Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor."*



John Peelle 1791-1879

From the files of Horace Peele

John, the son of **Passco "Isaac" Peelle** (1733-1807) and **Tabitha Dunigan** (1743-1826), was born in Wayne County, NC and first moved with his father and mother to Richmond County, NC in December 1803.

After his father died in 1807, John became restless and unhappy with his surroundings. He left Richmond County and traveled into the Territory of Indiana in 1811. He worked in Indiana for about two-three years before returning North Carolina to visit his Mother and other relatives. While in Richmond County on 6 March 1815, he married **Penina "Penny" Pate** (1795-1890), daughter of **Shadrack and Dicey Pate**, of Wayne County, NC. His mother **Tabitha** and other family members returned to Indiana with John. Unfortunately, they left their father **Pasco's** grave unmarked. It is believed to be in the Old Pate Cemetery in what was then Richmond County, now Scotland County, and close to where they lived.

John and his other family members first settled in Randolph County where John and Penny had their first child, William **Tecumseh Peelle** in 1816.

In 1817 John moved to New Garden Township of Wayne County and settled just 2 miles north of Fountain City where they had their other eleven children. They lived there until 1854 when they moved to Centerville, IN.

Speaking at the first meeting of the Old Settlers Association in the Temperance Hall in Richmond on September 7, 1855, John was elected a vice-president

and made a talk that was reported in the Richmond newspaper, the Palladium on June 24, 1857:

"He went to the northern part of the county where he worked for George Schuggart for \$10 a month.... Peelle had no money when he arrived here. He traded his wagon for a cow and some sheep. Dogs killed his sheep, his horse died, and his cow killed itself by drinking syrup from a sugar-camp kettle, which had been left exposed. However, he remained content and happy. Mr. and Mrs. Peelle were Quakers, but later joined the Methodist Church. In later life Mrs. Peelle returned to the Quaker Meeting. Peelle told the old settlers that he killed wolves in the early days and collected from the county for their scalps. As late as 1815 Indians were frequently seen in the county. He said he was not a skilled hunter but on one occasion killed two wild geese on a Wayne County pond."

At that 1855 meeting John Peelle told about trading a pair of pantaloons with Thomas Woodard but didn't finish his story. As he was about to leave the stand after finishing his talk, someone reminded him that he had forgotten to finish his story. Turning to the audience and laying his hands on his pantaloons, he said:

"These are the identical pantaloons for which I swapped another pair at the log-rolling contest after I came to this country. We went into a log meeting house close by to change them."

Speaking at Centerville in 1869, John is quoted as having said:

"I was born in the year 1791 near [David] Beard's Hatters Shop in old North Carolina. You know the plow made of a forked stick; the cotton rope traces; my tanning of leather or pretending to for the purpose of making my wife's shoes, which hurt her feet to this day. You know I have

told you before that after I came to this state, I often got up from the table hungry. I sighed with tears in my eyes for my mother's milk house in North Carolina. But we soon raised plenty of corn and squashes and pumpkins on which we fared sumptuously. We used to hand around a basket of turnips in place of apples. I

remember once at a neighbor's house I did not scrape the turnip as close as the good lady of the house thought I ought to; so she scraped it again and ate it herself. I believe I have seen as hard times as the next man. I made two farms from the green."

Beard's Hatter Shop was located near Jamestown in southwestern Guilford County, North Carolina. There is a state historical marker at the site on US 29-70A between Jamestown and High Point. Other records show that John was born in Wayne County, so there is some confusion in the above statement.

According to an article written about John Peele, upon his death, he had a birthright membership in the Orthodox Society of Friends who joined the Methodist Church. However, becoming dissatisfied with the M.E. Church, he joined Friends. He was a regularly recorded minister of the Gospel, "did much effective service in behalf of his beloved Master, Jesus, the Christ."

Also, in the same article, it is told that John and Penina had 12 children, all of whom lived to be adults; seven of them preceded him in death. The other five, **James, John, and Calvin Peelle**, and

Mrs. Mary Pierce and Mrs. Harriet Keever participated in his funeral.

John Peelle was one of the best know citizens of Centerville during the late sixties and seventies and was always a prominent figure at Old Settlers picnics. Mr. and Mrs. Peelle lived for a time in the Samuel Boyd property at School and Spruce Streets and later built the hose now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. William Wickard. It is in this house that Mr. Peelle died. His widow survived him several years. When asked how old she was she used to say that she did not know because her age was burned up. By this she meant that the records of the monthly meeting in North Carolina, where the date of her birth was registered, were destroyed when the meetinghouse burned. She evidently was past ninety as a photograph taken some time before her death contained pictures of her descendents to the sixth generation, the youngest being a girl of a few weeks.
