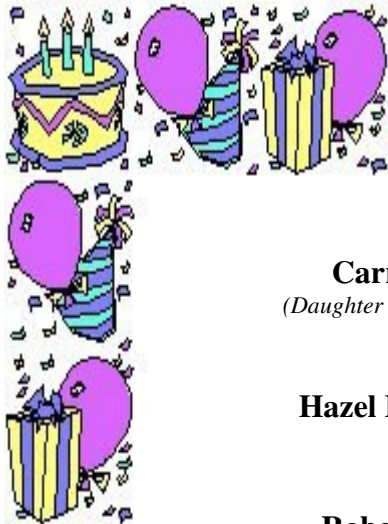

An update on Aunt Hazel from Willis Peele

Saturday, Nov 18, 2006:

This past Monday a Home Health nurse attending to Hazel insisted Hazel go to the hospital due to her inability to walk safely, her shortness of breath and obvious swelling in her legs. She was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Asheville.

The docs prescribed medications that immediately relieved the fluid retention causing the swelling and ran numerous tests to assess her general state of health. Her heart was of particular concern and it was determined that she had congestive heart failure to some degree. A pacemaker implant was discussed and steps were taken to correct her blood thickness (she was taking blood thinner meds) so the procedure could be done.

The pacemaker was installed yesterday and went very well. She did great and was resting well when we left about 7:30pm. I called her this morning and she sounded good and said she felt good.

She will be released on Monday to the same rehab unit she was in for her last rehab in August...the Brian Center in Weaverville...and will have physical and occupational therapy to try to get back on her feet.

Her future living arrangements depend on her ability to recover her mobility. I have serious doubts she will be able to return home and have discussed this with her. Shar and I have visited a retirement home in Mars Hill that she knows and likes, and that may well be where she goes after the Brian Center.

Tuesday, November 21, 2006

Aunt Hazel is now back at the Brian Center and will stay there for several weeks. After a week in the hospital I think it was a welcome relief! She has several friends there and has already visited with them. Her progress in rehab will dictate what happens next.

Tips & Tricks...

Have a large gift to wrap? Rather than struggle with regular gift wrapping paper, use a paper tablecloth to wrap your large gift. You usually can find one with a holiday pattern. Check your local Dollar Store!

Tips for a healthy & safe live Christmas tree:

- Leave the tree outside or in the garage for a few days before bringing inside to decorate.
- Make a fresh cut across the bottom, about 1" above base, so your tree can drink easily.
- Make a preservative: mix a quart of water with 1/2-cup of corn syrup and a tsp. of bleach.
- After a few days in the preservative, bring the tree inside and place it in a location away from direct sunlight and other heat sources (such as heating ducts, wood stoves and fireplaces.)
- Remember to add water to the reservoir daily.

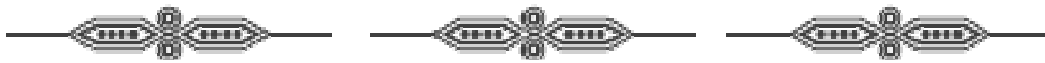

Qualifications of a Tax Enumerator

Did you know the criteria of being an enumerator?

The enumerators were supposed to be the more educated men of the community, but that sure didn't mean that they were the most moral of men. Just that they had people fooled!!!

1/ Up until about the **1900 census**, the enumerator had to be a **man**.

2/ He had to be able to **WRITE**, not to spell, but to write.

3/ It was **against the law**, for him to ask anyone how to spell either their first or last names. The reason being, that the government didn't want to make them feel stupid if they were unable to tell you how to spell anyone's name that was in the household.

4/ If the head of household or wife were not in at the time of the enumerators visit, then the enumerator had the right to ask the questions of anyone who was in the house at the time of his visit.

5/ If no one was at home at all, he had the right to ask the questions of ANYONE in the area!!!! (This should clarify why there are so many discrepancies on the different census's.)

6/ He had to use only **#10 Black India ink**, and he had to pay for it himself. (Some of the enumerators, would water down their ink, to make it go further, and **this is why some census images are so light and hard to read.**)
